1. Speeding in Neighborhoods: Final Meeting to Voice Your Views

The City of Knoxville next week will conduct the last of five public meetings on residential traffic safety as it seeks public comment for possible changes in its traffic calming policy.

The meeting begins at **5:30 p.m. Tuesday, October 22**, at **O'Connor Senior Center**, 611 Winona Street, just off East Fifth Avenue and a few blocks from the Hall of Fame exit on I-40. City officials will make presentations about traffic calming and then record the comments, questions, ideas and concerns of city residents and representatives of city neighborhood groups and other organizations.

Neighborhood groups are encouraged to send representatives. You do not have to be a resident of East Knoxville or Center City neighborhoods at attend and participate.

Public input will be critical in helping city staff draft the traffic calming policy for the coming years. A response to the public input and a first draft of the new policy will be published in the first quarter, followed by a public meeting for additional comment. The draft will be reworked as needed and then presented to the public and to City Council.

3. Aslan Sponsors "Visioning Workshop" for Vestal
